HOW TO IDENTIFY THE NEW NOTES AND COINS

The new notes are protected by a number of security features. The denominations are translated into Hausa, Igbo and Yoruba for easy identification. The notes are now smaller in size and have no # sign. The 20 Naira note is made of polymer which is plastic in nature.

FRONT

The existing portraits on the 5,10,20 and 50 Naira are retained.

A special symbol at the top left corner provides a distinctive feel for the blind to assist in recognising the denominations.

Vertical and horizontal serial numbering.

A light blue metallic stripe (iridescent band) running down the 50 Naira note.

The existing portraits on the 5 and 10 Naira are retained

The new 20 Naira note has the portrait of Ladi Kwali, a famous potter, while the 50 Naira note has the portrait of fishermen.

Map of Nigeria in National colours.

The denominations (5, 10, 20 and 50 Naira) are translated into Hausa, Igbo and Yoruba.

OTHER FEATURES



The iridescent band is a subtle shiny stripe running down the front of the N50 note. It is a shimmery light blue colour made up of traditional patterns.



In the watermark, the eagle is replaced with CBN logo and the letters 'CBN' in a vertical format which can be seen more clearly when the notes are held against



The watermark on the 20 Naira is replaced with a clear window which is a transparent part of the note in the shape of CBN logo. and can be seen by looking from either side of the note. The letters 'CBN' in a vertical format are adjacent to the window and are clearly visible from both sides of the note when held against light.



On the 20 Naira note, there is an oval-shaped, green coloured area in the lower part of the window. When the note is tilted, the colour changes from green to gold.

· The new coins are light weight, portable and convenient to carry, attractive and circular in shape.

The N2 coin is bi-metallic with the portrait of the National Assembly symbolising our

The N1 coin is also bi-metallic and retains the portrait of Herbert Macaulay, a foremost Nationalist.

The 50 kobo coin has one colour and retains the cobs of maize, depicting agriculture.

The Nigerian Coat of Arms appears on all the coins.
